## NEW CELL PHONE USE POLICY FOR NEXT SCHOOL YEAR

Upper Sandusky Schools will have a new cell phone use policy for students next school year. This policy comes as a result of trying to combat the various issues and policies concerning their use and/or misuse by students during the school day.

Cell phones bring with them the opportunity for cheating on tests, disruption of the educational process, facilitation of drug deals, sexting, bullying/intimidation of other students, the "tipping-off" of other students that school enforcement and supervision personnel are in areas they must supervise, not to mention students having in their hands a tool for the potential disruption of the academic process in a myriad of other ways.

If we are to be bluntly honest, the use of cell phones during the school day is more of a matter of convenience rather than necessity, and when the advantages versus the disadvantages are weighed, it is clearly within the best interests of students to restrict their use on school property to before and after school.

Any student violating school rules concerning cell phone use next year must be willing to forfeit his or her cell phone for a period of 30 days, at which time parents may pick up these phones.

More specific rules concerning the cell phone include:

No cell phones are to be possessed on school property unless left in student-owned vehicles. If brought into school during the time that school is in session, all cell phones must be turned off and stored in student lockers only (never in gym lockers). While it is preferred that student cell phones not be brought to school at all, such phones must be turned off at all times during the school day. Any student-owned cell phone ringing or used by a student during the school day will be held for a period of 30 days.

Teachers are also being asked to support this policy by

restricting their own use to planning periods and lunch periods. All are expected to "power down" their cell phones to "vibrate-only" during teaching periods and for emergency response and safety reasons.

We would require them to be completely turned off, but doing so would require precious seconds to "power up" in the event of a student emergency, so at the request of teachers, the "vibrate-only" policy for teachers should work best in serving everyone well.

## NATIONAL ROBOTICS CHALLENGE

Thirty-six enrichment students from Upper Sandusky Schools in grades 4-9 participated in the 2009 National Robotics Challenge held in Marion, Ohio, on April 17 and 18. Over 250 different robots participated in 14 different events over the two-day competition. Elementary, middle, high and post-secondary schools from at least 4 different states designed, built, and programmed robots to do a wide variety of skills.

The majority of Upper Sandusky's students participated in an event called Ag Bot. There were four different challenges that their robot was to accomplish to earn points. The robot was to complete tasks that would be found down on the farm such as feeding the bull, closing the gate to the sheep pen, tipping the grain wagon, and pushing or pulling the planter through the field. Brian Miller's team took first place in the high school division. Logan Dible's team and Walker Karg's team tied for second, while Brian Bils's team came in third in the middle school division. Kate Ritchey's team brought home a third place finish in the elementary division.

Twenty-six high school teams competed in the Robo Hockey event. Adam Bil's team lost in their fifth match after putting up a tough fight. (We'll be ready for next year!)

On Saturday, Danial Maltsbarger's team won first place in the challenging Robot Maze in the middle school division. This was the first

time any of our team members participated in this event. Other robot events include Sumo Robot, Mini Sumo, Top of the Hill and Art Robot. **B u t O h i o**

Northern University's ice cream making robot was the hit of the day! This robot filled your cup with ice cream, added sprinkles, and put the spoon in the cup for you! WOW!
